**Introduction**

The San Jacinto College Nursing department developed the *RN-to-BSN Nursing Student Handbook* for use by students enrolled in the program and faculty teaching in the program. The handbook is designed to provide information relating to the policies associated with the nursing program including, acceptance, progression, and completion. This handbook accompanies the San Jacinto College Student Handbook and catalog. Students should be familiar with all components of the handbook and applicants must attest during the application process that they have accessed and reviewed the RN-to-BSN Student Handbook, which is available on the RN-to-BSN program website.

students should address potential vaccination exemptions directly with the clinical/external learning site.

### **Statement of Philosophy and Purpose**

The RN-to-BSN program adheres to the philosophy of San Jacinto College as defined in the College's Vision, Mission, and Values <https://publications.sanjac.edu/student-handbook/general-information/mission-vision/>. The faculty believe all students should have access to affordable and high quality education and be led by nurse educators who foster personal growth through self-directed learning and appreciative inquiry. The College established the RN-to-BSN program in fulfillment of the College's mission to meet the educational needs of the surrounding communities. The RN-to-BSN operates within the structure of the College, benefiting from its strengths and resources as well as contributing to them.

The philosophy of the RN-to-BSN program reflects the faculty belief that nursing education facilitates a process of acquiring changes in knowledge, skills, and attitudes that are provided by unique learning opportunities that may originate with the nursing students. The nursing faculty believe that nursing education promotes a lifetime process of educational growth.

The nursing faculty believe that the teaching-learning nursing experience is an individual, active, and continuous process, which proceeds from simple to complex in theoretical, clinical, and distance learning environments. Faculty members function as mentors and facilitators, utilizing a variety of teaching strategies while demonstrating genuine interest in students as individuals. The faculty support a learner-centered environment, student engagement, self-directed learning, appreciative inquiring, and the task of providing opportunities for students to use new knowledge with existing knowledge to solve complex problems.

The nursing faculty believe that nursing involves four primary roles in the delivery of holistic health care to patient/clients, families, and communities. The conceptual model guides the incorporation of these four roles throughout the nursing curriculum. These four roles are: (1) Member of the Profession, (2) Provider of Patient-centered Care, (3) Patient Safety Advocate, and (4) Member of the Health Care Team as identified and defined in the *Differentiated Essential Competencies of Graduates of Texas Nursing Programs* (DECs) by the Texas Board of Nursing (TBON) (2021).

### **Organizing Framework**

The organizing framework of the College's RN-to-BSN program addresses the dynamic, ongoing interaction between the nurse and the patient/client as depicted in the conceptual model. The faculty follow the program's philosophy within the organizing framework that identifies common threads to be incorporated in the development of course objectives. The common threads are woven concepts in the organizing framework from the program's nursing philosophy through the course objectives to the student learning outcomes, class sequencing, internal/external learning experiences, and innovative teaching modalities.

### **Conceptual Model**

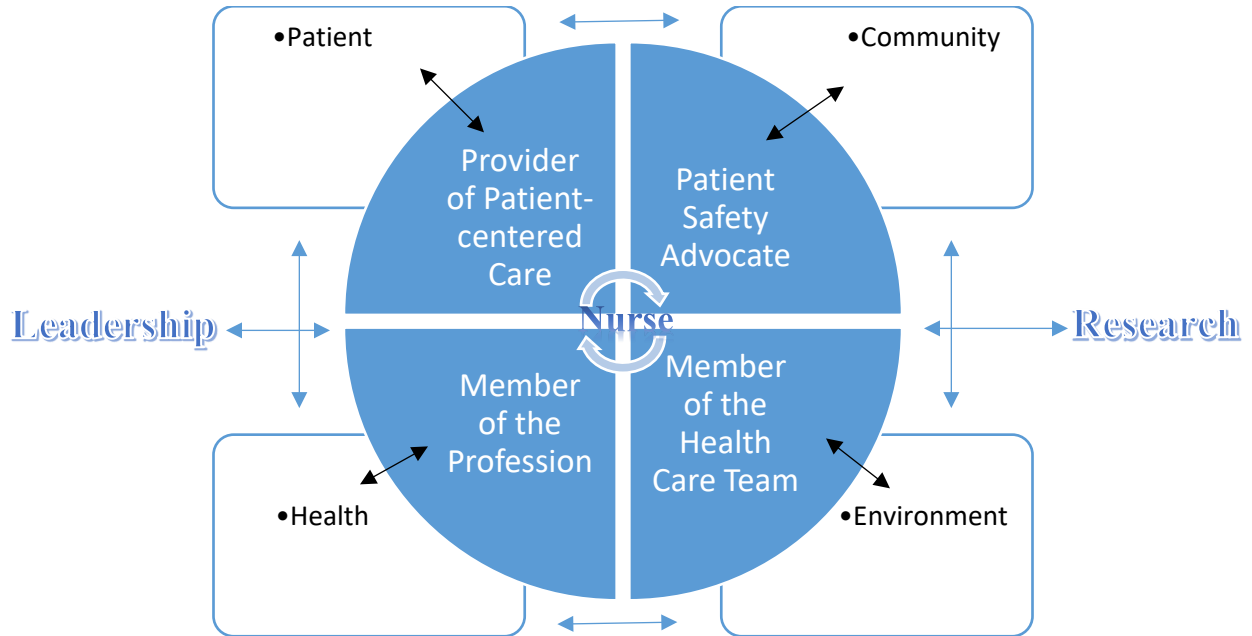
The conceptual model for the RN-to-BSN program depicts the dynamic, ongoing nurse-

patient/family/community interaction. The nurse brings to the patient/family/community the knowledge, clinical behaviors, judgements, and reasoning encompassed in the four primary roles of nurses.



*Significant definitions within the conceptual model include:*

**Nurse/Nursing:** Nursing is a patient-centered, dynamic, caring, professional practice that recognizes the inherent worth of human life and the intrinsic value of each individual throughout the lifespan. The nurse incorporates the holistic approach to patient care based on the four primary roles of nurses.

**Member of the Profession:**

- The nurse practices in accordance with the Texas Nurse Practice Act and TBON rules as well as federal, state, and local regulations.
- The nurse assumes responsibility and accountability for the quality of nursing care provided to patients, families, populations, and communities.
- The nurse promotes the practice of professional nursing through leadership activities and advocacy.
- The nurse demonstrates responsibility for continued competence in nursing practice and develops insight through reflection, self-analysis, self-care, and lifelong learning.

**Provider of Patient-centered Care:**

- The nurse uses clinical reasoning, knowledge, evidence-based practice, and research as the basis for decision-making and comprehensive patient care.
- The nurse determines the physical and mental health status, needs, and preferences of culturally, ethnically, and socially diverse patients, families, populations, and communities based upon interpretation of comprehensive health assessment findings.
- The nurse synthesizes comprehensive assessment data to identify problems, formulate goals/outcomes, and develop plans of care for patients, families, populations, and communities.
- The nurse provides safe, compassionate, comprehensive nursing care to patients, families, populations, and communities through a broad array of health care services.

**Patient Safety Advocate:**

- The nurse promotes safety by practicing in accordance with the Texas Nurse Practice Act and TBON rules and regulations as well as federal, state, and local regulations, and advocates on behalf of patients, families, and communities.
- The nurse implements measures to promote quality and a safe environment for patients, self, and others.
- The nurse formulates goals and outcomes using evidence-based and theoretical analysis to reduce patient and community risks.
- The nurse obtains instruction, supervision, or training as needed to promote safety.
- The nurse accepts, makes, and delegates assignments based on patient safety and organizational policy.

**Member of the Health Care Team:**

- The nurse coordinates, collaborates, and communicates with patients, families, populations, communities and the interdisciplinary health care team to plan, deliver, and evaluate care in a timely fashion to maintain optimal health status.
- The nurse serves as a health care advocate in monitoring and promoting quality and access to health care for patients, families, populations, and communities.
- The nurse uses multiple referral resources in the provision of quality care.

**Patient:**

- Defined as an individual or family on the health continuum.

**Community:**

- Defined as a group of individuals, population, or community on the health continuum.

**Health:**

- A dynamic state of wellness and illness that moves along a continuum throughout the lifespan.
- May indicate health promotion, disease, or wellness.

**Environment:**

- Conditions, circumstances, and influences surrounding and affecting the development and behaviors of the patient, family, population, or community.
- The environment has both internal and external variables.

**Leadership:**

- Defined as a dynamic process influencing others towards a common goal by promoting shared vision, empowerment, innovation, and inspiration.
- The nurse leader understands the large overall picture while also appreciating the unique needs of patients, families, and communities who are integrated in the complex health care system.

**Research:**

- Defined as a systematic method of rigor to evaluate quality outcomes to support clinical decision-making.
- Research guides the implementation of evidence-based practice.

### Program of Study

To meet the demands of an evolving health care system, the College grounded the curriculum in the sciences and arts, which ensures broad exposure to a variety of disciplines to provide opportunities for students to practice clinical reasoning in a diverse health care system. The curriculum supports the conceptual model by preparing nurses for the baccalaureate degree to learn, through appreciative inquiry, the skill sets required by the 21<sup>st</sup> century nurse.

Students admitted to the BSN program will have previously completed a pre-licensure Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) program. The College will apply up to 34 semester credit hours (SCH) of lower-division ADN (RNSG courses) to the 120 SCH hour BSN program.

Articulation and Transfer: Students with course rubrics different from the chart above should speak to the Department Chair for individual review of nursing transfer courses.

### General Education, 45 semester credit hours

Students admitted to the BSN program will have previously completed a pre-licensure ADN program that will often have included at least 15 SCH of general education courses; the College will apply previously completed general education courses to the College's core curriculum.

Students admitted to the program must complete the portion of the 42 SCH core curriculum not completed as part of their previously completed ADN program.

Students must also take an additional three SCH of Life and Physical Science to include CHEM 1305/1105 Introductory Chemistry I (shown below) or CHEM 1305/1105 General Chemistry I (not listed below but could be taken instead of CHEM 1305/1105).

### **Prescribed Electives, 10 semester credit hours**

Students admitted to the BSN program will have previously completed a pre-licensure ADN program that may have included at least seven hours of additional prescribed electives that the College will apply to the BSN program. In addition, the College will require students admitted to the BSN program to complete BIOL 1322, as a prescribed elective, prior to entering the program.

### **Upper-division Major Requirement (NURS), 31 semester credit hours**

The upper-level nursing courses include specific content related to the Differentiated Essential Competencies (DECs) for the baccalaureate degree nurse (Texas Board of Nursing, 2021). The courses are learner centered, focusing on a) student engagement, b) self-directed learning, c) appreciative inquiry, and d) opportunities for the student to use new knowledge with existing knowledge to solve complex problems. The curriculum will cover key topics related to baccalaureate-level nursing education to include, 1) community, 2) leadership, and 3) research. In addition to these key topics, the program will also focus on informatics and global/public health policy.

To meet the unique needs of the working RN, the College designed the curriculum to be taught via online learning delivery which may include the following: online anytime and online on a schedule through Blackboard, the learning management system (LMS) for the College. The RN-to-BSN program teaches all courses over eight weeks, unless otherwise noted.

The College will require students admitted to the BSN program to complete 31 SCH of upper-division, major courses focused on the Nursing discipline.

Students must complete all nursing courses with a C, or higher. Upon successful completion of all coursework (120 SCH), the student will be eligible to graduate with a Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing (BSN).

San Jacinto College utilizes Blackboard Learn to support online delivery of content for all courses and Blackboard Learn is the institutional course delivery system for online learning.

### **End-of-Program Student Learning Outcomes**

Graduates from the RN-to-BSN program should be able to participate as a member of the health care team as a competent practitioner in the roles of Member of the Profession, Provider of Patient-centered Care, Patient Safety Advocate, and Member of the Health Care Team. The graduates should be able to demonstrate the following:

- Promote the practice of professional nursing through advocacy and leadership activities while functioning within the nurse’s legal and ethical scope of practice.
- Synthesize comprehensive assessment data to identify problems, formulate goals, and develop a plan(s) of care for patients, families, populations, and communities using evidence-based practice and published research.
- Formulate goals and outcomes using an evidence-based and theoretical analysis of available data to reduce patient and community risk.
- Integrate the use of multiple referral resources and technology in monitoring and promoting quality health care by considering cost, effectiveness, and efficiency of care, continuity and continuum of care, and health promotion, maintenance, and restoration.

## Admission Requirements for the RN-to-BSN Program

To be considered for admission, prospective students should:

- Apply and be accepted to San Jacinto College. Students with foreign transcripts must have transcripts evaluated, at the student's expense, on a course-by-course basis by an approved evaluating company. Students should work with the Advising, Career & Transfer (ACT) Office to navigate the course requirements for the RN-to-BSN program. Complete an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) in Nursing degree from an accredited institution. Students graduating from San Jacinto College or living within the College's geographical area will have priority consideration for admission into the program.
- Hold an unencumbered, Texas RN license. The license must be valid throughout the program duration.
- Be currently employed as a professional nurse (employment verification required). This requirement is deferred for new graduated associate degree in nursing (ADN) applicants.
- Maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale.
- Reflect a grade of C in all previous nursing transfer courses.
- Submit one recommendation letter from the employer (supervisor) or former nursing faculty.

## Application Process

Students must submit the following information:

- RN-to-BSN Nursing Application (Appendix A).
- Proof of San Jacinto College graduate documentation (unofficial transcript).
- Unofficial transcripts supporting course work and cumulative GPA.
- One recommendation letter.
- Employment verification, if not a recent graduate from the ADN program

The application can be accessed at [BSN Admission Information - San Jacinto College](#). Students should submit all information via the portal that is noted on the BSN application website.

## Selection Process

Application session dates will be posted on the San Jacinto College website. Admission decisions are based on the highest scores achieved on the Admissions Rubric.

To begin the RN-to-BSN program, students must have no more than three outstanding general education courses.

Applicants who do not fully meet the acceptance criteria may be considered for **Conditional Approval**. This determination is made at the discretion of the RN-to-BSN Program Chair and will be outlined in the applicant's acceptance letter.

Applicants accepted into the RN-to-BSN program will receive an official acceptance letter via email. The letter will include the class schedule with registration information, program requirements, textbook lists and other information.

Applicants not accepted into the RN-to-BSN program will receive an official denial letter via email and may schedule a meeting with the Department Chair.

## Progression

The curriculum is built from simple to complex. The College expects students to complete the coursework in the designated sequence, as described above. The department has designated certain courses as prerequisite courses within the curriculum that students must complete in a specific order.

**Withdrawals:** A student may only withdraw from two (2) courses during the program. Students desiring to withdraw must submit an email to the Department Chair to schedule an advisory meeting to withdraw from the program/course. Students failing to submit an email to the Department Chair may forfeit the ability to return to the program.

**Course grades below 70:** Students may repeat only two (2) courses throughout the curriculum. Students must complete all coursework within two (2) years of the start of the program. A minimum final grade of 70 is required in all NURS courses.

## Graduation

Upon successful completion of all components of the RN-to-BSN program, the student will be eligible for graduation with a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree (BSN). The student is required to contact the ACT department for instructions for applying for graduation.

## Program Dismissal

The program will hold students accountable for following the progression guidelines for the program and expect students to complete the program in the designated time-period. The Nursing Program requires students to adhere to professional guidelines and may dismiss students for the following infractions:

- Failing to abide by San Jacinto College's Code of Student Conduct Policy;
- Receiving sanctions against nursing license from the Texas Board of Nursing;
- Receiving a conviction for criminal behavior impacting nurse licensure;
- Failing to demonstrate Fitness to Practice, according to Texas Board of Nursing Rule 213.29;
- Demonstrating unprofessional conduct—students are expected to adhere to the College's Values at all times; and
- Failing to abide by the Texas Board of Nursing's Good Professional Character guidelines (TAC 213.27).

Students subject to dismissal will meet with the Department Chair to discuss the situation and withdraw from the program. Students may meet with the Dean to discuss the situation relating to the dismissal and must schedule a meeting within five (5) business days of the decision rendered. The Dean, or designee, will schedule an appointment to meet with the student within five (5) days of the notification. The Dean will render a decision within five (5) days of the student meeting.

## **Attendance**

Students are encouraged to participate actively in online experiences. Students may not miss more than 10% of the course. Faculty members monitor online discussions and activities for attendance. Students should notify faculty, in advance, of expected absences. Faculty may, at their discretion and dependent upon student learning outcomes, assign make-up work. Students will have one week to submit any make-up work. The student may receive a penalty, as outlined in the syllabus/course handout, for the make-up work. The Community Assessment log must be submitted with the required hours to receive credit for the course. Failure to complete the required hours, or submit the final log, may constitute a grade of D earned for the course. Students are expected to communicate with the faculty members as soon as possible regarding a concern about meeting the required hours.

The College's Academic Calendar lists all holidays. The College does not permit students on campus during college closures. Course calendars will reflect the anticipated holidays for the term.

## **Grade Determination**

Faculty may measure the student's achievement of the learning outcomes by a variety of methods including, but not limited to, assignments, discussion boards, and individual/group presentations. Faculty will clearly communicate the grade determinations in the syllabus. It is the student's responsibility to seek clarification regarding assignments and due dates. Faculty will post grades for all assignments in Blackboard. Students must seek clarification on all posted grades within one-week of faculty posting grades. All assignments listed in a course are required. Students are expected to complete every type of assignment (e.g., discussion boards, ethics corners, written work). Partial completion – such as only submitting certain types of assignments – is not permitted.

The grading distribution will follow San Jacinto College's guidelines:

### **Academic Advising**

The RN-to-BSN program promotes a learner-focused environment that supports student success. Students are encouraged to maintain open communication with faculty throughout each course and the program. Faculty may initiate discussions related to academic performance or progress and will document advising interactions using the RN-to-BSN Academic Advising Form.

Students are encouraged to contact faculty at the earliest sign of academic difficulty so that appropriate support can be provided. When needed, faculty may refer students to the Department Chair for additional guidance. Within the RN-to-BSN program, faculty and the Department Chair work collaboratively to support student retention and academic success.

The College's ACT office provides comprehensive services to help students with educational planning, career and personal development, and short-term personal counseling. The purpose of the ACT office is to create a collaborative learning experience that empowers students to maximize their potential while completing their educational goals. This process involves a series of ongoing and intentional conversations between the student and an Educational Planner that establishes a pathway to student success and the realization of educational, career, and life goals.

### **Retention Specialist**

Faculty and the RN-to-BSN Program Chair serve as the program's Retention Specialists. Their role is to support student success by monitoring progress, providing guidance, and connecting students with appropriate resources. Students are encouraged to reach out directly to faculty or the Program Chair for assistance with academic or program-related concerns.

### **Course Requirements**

Faculty will provide students with a course syllabus, handout, and calendar for each course. To maintain continuity throughout the curriculum, the department has established guidelines relating to unit assignments, discussion boards, and exams.

**Unit Content and Assignments:** The courses are not self-paced. Faculty will make each of the units, assignments, and discussions available and due based on the course calendar. Select unit materials will open 0800 on Monday morning and will close at 0759 the following Monday. Unit assignments, according to the course calendar, will be due at this time. After 0759 on Monday, all links to take or submit assignments will be unavailable, and students will not be able to submit the assignment. As such, the department encourages students to manage and budget their time throughout the week to complete each week's assignments successfully on time. The

department recommends that students print the course calendar and keep it handy, as this will determine their success in the course. The department designed the course and program outcomes to build from simple to complex at the baccalaureate degree level. The faculty developed a presentation rubric for assessing specific outcomes associated with individual and/or group outcomes. All assignments listed in a course are required. Students are expected to complete every type of assignment (e.g., discussion boards, ethics corners, written work). Partial completion – such as only submitting certain types of assignments – is not permitted.

**Unit Discussion Boards:** Each unit of this course will have one, or more, associated discussion boards. For discussion boards, you are required to post an initial entry and respond to at least one classmate's post. Your response to a classmate should be a detailed response, more than just simply stating "I agree". Each discussion board will have a grading rubric attached, so you will know what is expected of you and how your assignment will be graded. Discussion posts will become available on Mondays at 0800 with the initial posting due by 0800 on Wednesdays of the same week. Student replies to their peers are due between 0800 Thursday through 0800 Monday of the following week. Each discussion board must contain a citation from the text and one other resource, using APA format.

### **Accessibility Services**

The College has Accessibility Services counselors to assist with student success. The counselors will meet with students to determine the type of accommodation needed to assist students in completing their coursework. ## **San Jacinto College ID Badge and Program Dress Standards**

Students are required to wear a San Jacinto College ID badge when on campus and in the community completing coursework. The RN-to-BSN program does not require specific uniform, however when on-campus or in clinical, professional business casual attire with closed toe shoes is required. The department expects students to always dress professionally when conducting community assessments and interviews. If applicable, students should cover tattoos and ensure that no body piercing is visible while in the community. *Remember, you are representing the trusted profession of nursing.*

**The department expects students who are attending an observation site secured by the College to meet the learning outcomes to follow the guidelines below:**

- Wear professional clothes, business casual with closed toe-shoes.
- Wear the San Jacinto College ID badge at all times.
- Do not engage in patient care or medication administration. This is an observation experience.
- Follow Confidentiality/HIPPA guidelines, per institutional protocol.

## **Clients with Communicable Disease**

Students will be completing community assessment and activities that may expose them to a communicable disease, which is an occupational/professional challenge in nursing and direct patient care. As Registered Nurses, students should follow standard protocols and procedures to reduce the risk for acquiring an infection or communicable disease. However, all areas of health care practice have inherent risks, and no area is completely risk free. Students are responsible for all costs associated with direct, or potential, exposure and should contact their health care provider with any concerns.

## **Confidentiality/HIPPA**

While the RN-to-BSN program does not involve clinical rotations in hospitals or other settings, students are still required to follow confidentiality and HIPAA requirements. Students will be assessing communities, which may involve meeting with individuals within the community. Clients have the right to confidentiality of all records and communications, written or verbal, between patient and health care providers.

1. Student nurses will not reveal (to anyone other than their faculty member) any confidential information that may come to their knowledge in the course of their

2. Student nurses will hold in confidence all personal matters and all family affairs of which the student becomes aware during the course of caring for the individual clients.
3. Students may be dismissed from the program for breach of confidentiality.

### **Social Media**

As Registered Nurses, students will be held accountable to the Texas Board of Nursing professional standards relating to the use of social media and professional boundaries. Any posting on social media related to patients, communities, or the program may result in dismissal from the program. ### **Student Evaluations of Community and Leadership Capstone**

Faculty will evaluate students on mastery of content associated with the community and leadership courses, based on the course syllabi and learning objectives. The students will track their weekly assessment findings on the project log form for each course and relate the information to concepts learned throughout the program. While the RN-to-BSN program does not require students to participate in designated clinical rotations, the assessment rubrics clearly note the skills and objectives relating to the two courses requiring practical experience and/or service learning.

### **Student Feedback**

The RN-to-BSN program values student feedback and will provide opportunities for students to evaluate courses at the conclusion of each course throughout the program. The office of Institutional Research & Effectiveness initiates the anonymous feedback about courses.

In addition to this College-wide course evaluation process, the department will provide students the opportunity to submit evaluations/recommendations about courses and/or the program through various methods. Opportunities include, but are not limited to, participation in advisory councils or committee meetings, Department Chair meetings, and Dean Talks (informal meetings with the Dean).

## **Appendix A RN-to-BSN Program Application**

### **The RN-to-BSN Program enrolls in Spring and Fall.**

The Spring application cycle is mid-September through the first week of January.

The Fall application cycle is mid-April through the second week of July.

We at San Jacinto College are excited to help you take the next step in your nursing career. As you prepare to apply for our BSN program, it's important to understand our application requirements. This will help you put your best foot forward. Let's dive in!

First, if you are not enrolled at San Jac, you must apply to the college first through ApplyTexas. Once you are accepted you will receive a G# which is needed to apply to the RN-to-BSN Program.

The RN-to-BSN application process is online. <https://www.sanjac.edu/programs/areas-of-study/health/nursing/bsn/admission-info/> Applicants must fill out the application and checklist out completely and submit the application to the RN-to-BSN Program by the closing of the application session. The office must receive all items by 4:00 PM of the last date of the application session.

### **Students who apply to the RN-to-BSN Program must meet the following expectations:**

- Apply and be accepted to San Jacinto College. Students with foreign transcripts must have transcripts evaluated, at the student's expense, on a course-by-course basis by an approved evaluating company. Please work with the ACT Office for assistance
- Complete an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) in Nursing degree from an accredited institution. Students graduating from San Jacinto College or living within the College's geographical area will have priority consideration for admission into the program
- Hold an unencumbered, Texas RN license. License must be valid through the program duration
- Be currently employed as a professional nurse with employment verification required; This requirement is deferred for new graduated associate degree in nursing (ADN) applicants.
- Maintain a cumulative GPA 2.5 on a 4.0 scale
- Reflect a grade of C in all previous nursing transfer courses
- Submit one recommendation letter from employer (supervisor) or former nursing faculty.
- Completed prerequisite course work: MATH 1314 or higher; CHEM 1305/1105 or CHEM 1311/1111 and BIOL 1322

## Application Process

Students must submit the following information:

- Proof of San Jacinto College (or other College) graduate documentation (unofficial transcript).
- Unofficial transcripts supporting course work and cumulative GPA.
- One recommendation letter.
- Employment verification, if not a recent graduate from the ADN program

## Program of Study

To meet the demands of an evolving healthcare system, the curriculum is grounded in the sciences and arts, and ensures broad exposure to a variety of disciplines in order to provide opportunity for students to practice clinical reasoning in a diverse healthcare system. The curriculum supports the conceptual model by preparing nurses at the baccalaureate degree to learn, through appreciative inquiry, the skillsets required by the 21-st century nurse.

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program will include 120 semester credit hours (SCH).

### NURS 3432 Community Health Nursing (4:3-7)

Course Description: This course introduces the registered nurse to concepts of community health utilizing the population-focused nursing process. Includes levels of disease prevention, principles of epidemiology, community assessment, environmental health, disaster preparedness, and professional nursing roles and interprofessional collaboration in various community settings. Emphasis is on health promotion, risk reduction, and disease management across the lifespan in selected community settings. Practice experience is required and can be completed in the community.

Focus: The course is designed to allow students the opportunity to explore concepts relating to community health and includes a combination of didactic and practical applications. The course includes a total of 160 contact hours (4:3-7) and includes online and practical learning opportunities. The course is designed to build from simple to complex and emphasizes health promotion, risk reduction, and disease management across the lifespan in selected community settings. Students will be required to travel to designated communities to complete practical learning for this course and are required to maintain a log of activities throughout the course. An online group presentation is required for this course.

### NURS 4457 Leadership & Management (4:3-1)

Course Description: This course explores leadership and management theories, resource allocation, the nurse as a change agent, member of the profession, communication, and quality improvement in the healthcare setting.

Focus: This course is uniquely designed to allow the student to apply previous knowledge obtained from the associate degree nursing course to the new content associated with the broadened scope of practice, according to the differentiated essential competencies for the baccalaureate degree nurse (Texas Board of Nursing, 2021). This course includes a total of 64 hours and includes online and a capstone project. The course also requires online/virtual clinical experience. Students will incorporate the information they have learned during the year as they assess their local places of employment, consider best practices, and develop a Change Management Capstone Project. The students will track their weekly assessment findings on the project log form and relate the information to concepts learned throughout the program. Students will be required to prepare an abstract on their Change Management Project and provide a poster presentation to their peers in the last week of the class. Should a student not have a location to meet the course objectives at the time he or she takes NURS 4457, San Jacinto College has secured observation sites to meet the Leadership and Management Course Guidelines. Students must submit an email to the Department Chair 60 days prior to taking the course to assure placement by the start date for the course. Students failing to provide the 60-day notice may forfeit timely completion of the course. It is the student's responsibility to notify the faculty member and Department Chair if he or she needs assistance in meeting the course objectives.
